Information for Parents and Students:

- Students do not report to homeroom. They should report directly to their exam period.
- Students may exempt the first semester under the following conditions:
 - A. Seniors—(1) with at least a 90 average in year-long classes and in compliance with the OPS policies, (2) with an 85 average in an Honors course and in compliance with the OPS policies, or (3) with an 80 average in an AP course and in compliance with the OPS policies or (4) attend the minimally required sessions of the senior seminar.
 - B. Students (6th-11th) may not exempt the first semester exam unless the course is a semester course.
 - C. Students taking a semester course may exempt the first semester exam with an average of a 90 (seniors with an 87) and in compliance with OPS policies.
- Students need only to be here based on time period of testing. Sixth graders (5th period) and seventh graders (4th period) do not have to report for their rotation classes. Eighth graders do not have to report for their physical education class. If these students report to school, they must report to B-4 during their rotation or physical education class periods.
- Students having two exams on the same day may *not* leave the campus between exams.
- Students having to arrive at school for one test only (8-9:30 AM) but having to stay afterwards will go to B-4 for supervision (Mrs. Garrick.)
- Students having personal vehicles can arrive and depart based on the time period of testing. Once students leave the campus, they may not return unless they have to pick up other students for a ride home.
- Students who have an exam at 8:00 AM but do not have an exam at 10:00 AM may leave school at the end of the exam so that they may go home and study. If they have to wait for a ride, they must go to B-4. No one should be in the halls or outside the buildings.
- Students who do not have an exam at 8:00 AM but have an exam at 10:00 AM do not have to arrive at school until 9:50 AM for their 10:00 AM exam. If a student arrives for a second exam before 9:30 AM, he/she must report to B-4.
- Students who have no exams on a given day do not have to report to school.
- All rules, *including the dress code*, will be in effect during exam days. A Level-1 detention will be awarded for non-compliance!







Immediately we started on a quest to find this young OPS Band member since he wore a band shirt. After twenty-four hours with Principal McGee's diligence, the band leader, Ms. Sullivan, identified the young man. What a remarkable discovery!

The money was delivered to Mr. Sean Green, a fourth grader, on Monday morning at the Lower Campus Office. Thinking he would be thrilled to win \$106 from the 50/50 football game drawing, he calmly smiled and said he wanted all the winnings to be donated to the Varsity Volleyball's "Tackle Cancer" research fundraiser. As a kid, Pamela Reynolds (OPS junior), now 17, had to have her legs and some of her fingers amputated. But it hasn't stopped her from walking with pride.

Everybody is different, and so is everybody's story of self-acceptance. That's why Seventeen decided to team up with Instagram to launch the #Perfectly Me campaign. When you use and share the hashtag, we hope you will connect with a movement that encourages you to feel confident exactly as you are.

Yes, I know — I don't have legs. A shark ate them while I was surfing! Just kidding. That's not really what happened. The true story isn't nearly as cool, but here it is: When I was a baby, I had meningitis (a disease that infects the fluid around the brain and spinal cord), and I had to have my legs and some of my fingers amputated.

Because everything happened when I was so young, how I look has never seemed weird to me. I consider my body normal because this is just the way I am. I grew up with a pretty strong self-image because my parents and sister have always told me that I'm perfect and I believed them. But I've had to deal with other people's awkward stares and reactions to my prosthetics, and that's when it hits me that I don't look like most people. I've wondered, Is that okay? Should I feel sad? But then I remind myself that I rock at life. You name a sport and I've done it: cheerleading, softball, tennis, track, swimming. These days, I play varsity soccer and volleyball, and I even have a job as a lifeguard. I may not have "real" feet, but I can save your life because I'm tough like that.

So, yeah, I know what it feels like to be different — and that's not a bad thing. But more importantly, I also know what it feels like to score a winning goal and to swim faster than someone who has already counted me out. My body can do what anyone else's can do — and a lot of times, it can do it even better.






Orangeburg Prep - Preparing for College



This recognition goes to the top 11 players, regardless of classification, in the Orangeburg area and surrounding coun-



ties. During the Indians Week Zero 29-14 win over Hilton Head Prep, Bill rushed 23 times for 146 yards and 3 touchdowns. On defense, he recorded 9 total tackles, 2 tackles for loss, and a fumble recovery. For his performance in this game, Bill was recognized by the Orangeburg Touchdown Club as its Defensive Player of the Week. He and his parents, along with Mrs. McGee, Coach Stoudenmire, Coach Gillam, and Coach Palmer, attended the opening meeting and luncheon for the 2016 season of the Orangeburg Touchdown Club on August 25th, where he was presented his award by legendary SCSU Coach Willie Jeffries.




High-Spirited Bonfire Pep Rally

Teamwork, on and off the Playing Field

Members of the Orangeburg Prep football team spent some of their Saturday morning practice time unloading trailers full of blankets bound for humanitarian relief efforts in war-torn areas of Africa and the Middle East. "It would have taken eight men hours to accomplish what these forty-five guys were able to do in twenty minutes," said assistant coach Dr. Sam Lambrecht.

The boxes of emergency blankets were stacked onto pallets and will be shipped overseas through Global Aid Network (GAIN), the humanitarian arm of Cru, formerly Campus Crusade for Christ. The local effort was coordinated by Marvin Bozard, field strategist for GAIN, and Randy Boland of Bowman, who spends many hours volunteering for the ministry.

"Sometimes you just have to chuckle at the way God answers prayers," Bozard said. "When I called Sam Lambrecht presenting the fact that we had a semi and another large trailer loaded with boxes and I needed help, I was thinking he would connect with some Orangeburg church partners we had worked with in the past, hoping to get eight to ten people to show up. Having the entire football team made light work out of a potentially hot, laborious job.

"Teamwork makes a difference on the football field as well as on the mission field," Bozard said.
