Information for Parents and Students:

- Students do not report to homeroom. They should report directly to their exam period.
- Students may exempt the first semester under the following conditions:
 - A. Seniors—(1) with at least a 90 average in year-long classes and in compliance with the OPS policies, (2) with an 85 average in an Honors course and in compliance with the OPS policies, or (3) with an 80 average in an AP course and in compliance with the OPS policies or (4) attend the minimally required sessions of the senior seminar.
 - B. Students (6th-11th) may not exempt the first semester exam unless the course is a semester course.
 - C. Students taking a semester course may exempt the first semester exam with an average of a 90 (seniors with an 87) and in compliance with OPS policies.
- Students in grades 6th-12th must stay for the entire exam period. Only seniors may leave after exam completion.
- Students need only to be here based on time period of testing. Sixth graders (5th period) and seventh graders (4th period) do not have to report for their rotation classes. Eighth graders do not have to report for their physical education class. If these students report to school, they must report to the library during their rotation or physical education class periods.
- Students having two exams on the same day may not leave the campus between exams.
- Students having to arrive at school for one test only (8-9:30 AM) but having to stay afterwards will go to the library for supervision (Mrs. Garrick.)
- Students having personal vehicles can arrive and depart based on the time period of testing. Once students leave the campus, they may not return unless they have to pick up other students for a ride home.
- Students who have an exam at 8:00 AM but do not have an exam at 10:00 AM may leave school at the end of the exam so that they may go home and study. If they have to wait for a ride, they must go to the library. No one should be in the halls or outside the buildings.
- Students who do not have an exam at 8:00 AM but have an exam at 10:00 AM do not have to arrive at school until 9:50 AM for their 10:00 AM exam. If a student arrives for a second exam before 9:30 AM, he/she must report to the library.
- Students who have no exams on a given day do not have to report to school.
- All rules, including the dress code, will be in effect during exam days. A Level-1 detention will be awarded for noncompliance!



A Junior and a Senior Earn Eagle Rank

Boy Scouts honored at a recent ceremony were two Orangeburg Prep seniors. They have joined an elite group by attaining the rank of Eagle. Josh Hutto along with David Geddings, took the Eagle Scout oath at a July 8 event at Cox Wood. Eagle Scout is the highest achievement or rank attainable in the Boy Scouts of America. Since the award was first presented in 1912, only 4 percent of Boy Scouts have been granted the rank after a lengthy review process. Hutto is a high academic achiever and is also a good marksman, especially in archery, Johnson said. "He actually won a competition one year at camp," Johnson said. "He did a great job." Hutto's Eagle project was at The Oaks, where "he built ... an arbor with seeding at the nursing home. So it was kind of a construction project," Johnson said.

Geddings' Eagle project involved the beautification of the Brookland campus of the Connie Maxwell Children's Home. "He cleaned out the pond that had overgrown," Johnson said. The pond and its dock had been unusable for a while until Geddings' project. Also Geddings and his fellow Scouts cleaned up around the fire pit and fixed up other areas, Johnson said. Geddings is a senior at Orangeburg PrepGeddings was senior patrol leader last year, which is "kind of like the CEO of the troop," Johnson said. "In Boys Scouts, the troop is boy-led. They're guided by the scoutmaster, (but) the senior patrol leader implements everything ... I call (Geddings) a silent leader." Johnson noted Geddings is an excellent marksman. "Whenever we went to camp, if we ever had competitions in rifle shooting or shotguns, he was like the ace-in-thehole," Johnson said. "Every time I went, he won." Geddings is a senior at Orangeburg Prep.

2018 began Senior year!






Bill MettsOrangeburg Touchdown Club Offensive Player of the Week

Bill rushed 24 times for 182 yards and 2 touchdowns in leading the Indians to their first victory over a AAA opponent in several years. Congratulations to Bill.


